Revisions made to 2008-2009 calendar

Please review the 2008-09 school calendar that is enclosed with this newsletter. There are two revisions that have been added. Once again this year, the calendar does include two-hour late starts to provide teachers an opportunity to collaborate, to learn, and to engage in conversations for staff development/training. Education requires a collective effort between home and school, and we encourage all parents to take an active role in your child's education and to help support their academic, social, emotional, and physical growth. With the support of parents and community members, Wakefield Community School will continue the tradition of excellence.



Parents, students asked to review school safety measures

A reminder that after 8:15 a.m. each school day, the only entrances that will be unlocked are the doors directly east of the elementary office and the doors in circle drive across from the media center. We need your cooperation to keep our kids safe, so before or after school, or during the school day, please do not drive in the elementary parking lot (buses only), and please do not park along the curb in circle drive. That is a loading and unloading zone only. If you are planning to pick up kids after school, vehicles should park in the angled parking stalls north of the elementary building on 8th street. We ask that all visitors check in at the office. Safety of our students is more important than convenience.

Breakfast, lunch costs to increase in August 2008

Breakfast and lunch prices at the Wakefield School district will increase in August 2008. This is the first price increase in several years. The lunch program is self-sufficient and not supported by local tax dollars, but during the 2007-08 school year, food and transportation cost increases caused a \$13,038 shortfall. Costs for the breakfast/lunch program (salary/benefits; food; equipment/supplies) were \$196,639 while revenues were \$183,601. Our lunch program meets all state and federal regulations, and over 95% of students participate on a daily basis. In addition to the government commodities program, we utilize the cooperative purchasing program to buy food, which is a competitive statewide program available to school districts, so we are getting the best "deal" we can. With higher costs anticipated for delivery, food, and related items, the following prices have been set for the 2008-09 school year:

Breakfast (K-12) \$1.00

Lunch (K-6) \$1.50; (7-12) \$2.00; (Adults) \$2.50

The reduced price for lunch will be \$.40 for families that qualify and \$.30 for breakfast (set by the state). We will continue to provide free seconds at lunch for grades 7-12. Milk price remains \$.25. Soft serve ice cream cones (optional) will be \$.25 for grades K-6, grades 7-12 will be \$.50.

We project that the changes should keep our lunch program self-sufficient for another year. Due to the efficiencies of our lunch program, our prices are at or below the rates charged by area schools.

Households may qualify for free, reduced lunches

We strongly encourage families to apply to receive free/reduced priced meals. Applications must be submitted each year.

Forms may be picked up at the school office, and will be distributed to all students the first day of school. Forms will also be available at “Meet and Greet” night.

Applications may be filled out at any time during the school year, and families may reapply if there has been a change in household income. The income levels for qualification are established by the federal government, and the information is kept confidential. Not only is it a benefit to families, our local lunch program receives federal reimbursements for each meal served. The more students who qualify for the free/reduced meals, the more federal and state funds/grants our school district will be eligible to receive, plus this is an important factor in calculating the amount of state aid the district receives annually.

Community meeting planned in fall to update patrons on track project

The Wakefield School district is in the planning stages for a track project and football practice facility. A committee of school board members, administrators, and coaches has been working with Carlson-West-Povondra architects on the design phase of the facility. We are currently exploring various options to undertake the project within our budget limitations. This fall we will host a community meeting to update district



patrons on the project. As more information becomes available, future updates will be published in the school newsletter and Wakefield Republican. Various “smaller” maintenance projects have been completed and others are planned for the future to keep our educational facilities in good condition. With the increasing costs for fuel, transportation, and utilities, now more than ever we will be focusing on ways to become more efficient that allows us to cut costs without decreasing services.

School closings, student absences procedures

If students are absent from school, please notify the office no later than 8:15 a.m. Notifying the school is the parents’ responsibility. If the school hasn’t been notified by 8:15, phone calls will be initiated by the school.



School closings will be carried on all Sioux City radio and TV stations, as well as radio stations KTCH (Wayne) and WJAG (Norfolk). If the weather turns bad during the course of the day, parents are encouraged to stay tuned to KTCH.

Student accident insurance available

The school does not carry accident insurance on its students, but does make such a policy available to the parents and guardians.

Parents wishing to obtain a form are asked to contact the high school office, 287-2012. Forms will also be sent home with students the first day of school.

Principal's Notes

2008-09 school year starts August 19

The 2008-2009 school year is upon us! I hope everyone has had an enjoyable summer and I hope you have plans to enjoy your last few days before getting into the swing of the school year.

The first day of school is August 19, beginning with our annual flag raising ceremony. Students in grades 7-12 will go to the main gym for a brief assembly (after the flag-raising) followed by meetings with their class sponsors to review the student handbooks. Students will go to each class on a shortened schedule that day.

Improvements made to building during summer

Several projects have been occurring (almost simultaneously!) this past summer. The summer began with the removal of chalkboards to allow for the installation of new marker boards and bulletin boards in many classrooms. In early June the old blue lockers in the high school were removed, and new maroon lockers were installed, each of which has a built-in combination lock. Also in early June, Mr. Volk was busy painting the east wall of the main gym, preparing it for the hanging of championship signs (created by Mr. Volk's students).

Beginning in July, carpet was installed in some classrooms, such as the music room and Mr. Metzler's room. Also in July, new steps were constructed outside the east door of the high school, and a space was created outside the northwest corner of the elementary to better house our dumpsters.

All of this in the midst of the usual work done by the custodial crew, including

waxing of both gyms and all hallways, touch-up painting, cleaning of classrooms, etc. Be sure to tell the custodial crew what a wonderful job they have been doing this summer!

New lockers installed

As mentioned above, new lockers were installed in the high school. These new lockers each contain a built-in combination lock, which means that the lockers will lock automatically when students close their lockers. Students will be given their combination either during Meet and Greet Night, or during class meetings on the first day of school. Students will be available during Meet and Greet Night to assist students with their new combination locks.



Cell phone expectations

Students who bring cell phones (or any other electronic devices) to school will be expected to have the device turned off and kept in their pockets, book-bags, or lockers. Cell phones and other devices should not be used during the school day. If parents need to contact their children, they may call the school and a message will be given to the student. Cell phones (and other devices) are very distracting to the learning environment, and also can become potentially harmful if used improperly (harassing photos, text messages, etc.). As stated in the student handbook, cell phones and other devices

may be confiscated and parents may be expected to come to school to retrieve the device. Parents, please help us teach our students the difference between proper and improper uses of cell phones.

Don't forget "Meet & Greet"

Don't forget to attend Meet and Greet Night, 6:00 p.m., August 18. Students will be available to assist with the new lockers, as well as give tours and hand out class schedules. The evening will also give parents and students a chance to see the improvements made to the school over the summer.

Family Education and Privacy Act

The Family Education and Privacy Act generally provides that student records are confidential and not available for public release. However, an educational institution may release directory information after notice has been given of the categories of information that are designated for release.

Wakefield Community School will not release the names of students to any person or organization for solicitation purposes. Any person or group requesting directory information must state the purpose for

which the directory will be used. Wakefield Community School will release the names and information of students for school related events and activities (activity programs, honor roll lists, school news releases, etc). If parents or students do not wish to have their name and information released for these purposes, they should bring a written request to the high school principal.

The above statement will serve as official notice to our parents and students.



Notes from the school nurse

Kindergarten and Out of State Transfer Requirements

Nebraska law requires that parents or legal guardians furnish the following documents to the school for those students entering kindergarten or transferring from out of state: a certified copy of the student's birth certificate, a physical examination by a physician, physician's assistant, or an advanced practice registered nurse within six months prior to the school of school, a visual examination by a physician, physician assistant, an advanced practice registered nurse, or an optometrist within six months prior to the start of school, and evidence of immunization against diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (DTP), polio (OPV/IPV), measles, mumps, rubella (MMR), Hepatitis B (HBV), Varicella (chicken pox) and Haemophilus Influenzae type b (Hib).

Your child should have at least: 3 DTP with at least one given after the 4th birthday, 3 polio, 2 MMR, 3 HBV, and 1 chickenpox if less than 13 years of age. If your child is 13 years of age or older, they will need to receive 2 chickenpox immunizations. If your child has had the chickenpox disease, there is a form that needs to be completed, and in this case your child would not need to have the chickenpox immunization.

Students with Asthma/Anaphylaxis

All schools in Nebraska are now prepared to respond to life-threatening asthma and anaphylaxis emergencies.

Emergency response team members have been trained to identify signs and symptoms of a "breathing emergency" and respond by calling 911, and administering EpiPen followed by nebulized albuterol. All emergency response team members are trained in CPR.

Please let me know if your child has asthma or severe allergic reactions/anaphylaxis by contacting me or completing your child's annual health history form. I will be making asthma action plans for those students with asthma.
